

Who are CROWS?

We are a group of volunteers, based in Mytholmroyd who, for nearly ten years, have helped maintain and repair the footpath and bridleway network in the Upper Calder and Ryburn Valleys.


We currently have nearly 30 volunteers (one third of whom are women). We have no paid staff, so as well as taking part in work parties, volunteers also contribute to the running of the organisation.

This review outlines the range of jobs we have done this year and the places where we worked.

Where we work



Some highlights of the year

Most of our work involved small jobs that had been reported by the general public, but we also completed some larger projects.

- We refurbished the paths in the new "*Three Pecket Well Walks"* leaflet which will be published shortly.
- We made several improvements on the Pennine Way that were identified by Natural England.
- We built boardwalks across Erringden Moor to prevent further damage to the fragile ecology of the moor. The work involved the "*Big Carry"* that enlisted the help of groups of people and individuals to transport 700 pieces of timber across the moor.
- The route of the Coiners Walk was repaired and improved to cope with the expected increase in use after the TV drama, "*The Gallows Pole"*, has been screened.
- We have continued working three days a week (in nearly all weathers), and, during the year, we ran about 270 work parties with over 700 days worked by volunteers.



Improving the organisation

We all joined CROWS to improve rights-of-way, but to do that, we need an infrastructure to support the work. To be sustainable, we have continued to share the organisational workload. Significant developments this year were:

- We updated our constitution and now have a registration with the Charity Commission as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (1201645).
- With the help of Ian Whitehead at Calder Computers, we redesigned our online system for reporting problems making it much easier to use.
- We improved the web page for Just Giving donations, making it much simpler for people to donate.
- We developed guidance and training so that CROWS volunteers know how to build stiles that are safe and easy to use.

Plans for 2023/24

- We have agreed an exciting 5-year partnership with Weir Minerals Europe (based in Todmorden) to repair and improve the Todmorden Centenary Way.
- We have identified substantial work from surveys of paths around Fallingroyd and Mayroyd, the riverside path in Cragg Vale, and the published routes "Three Walks around Ripponden".
- We will carry out work in the Todmorden area (from Portsmouth to Walsden) using funds received from the Todmorden Wind Farm, through the Community Foundation for Calderdale (CFFC).
- We hope that funding will become available for further work on the Pennine Way.
- We will celebrate our 10th anniversary.
